My Experience of Coming to Canada

When I took the challenge to come to Canada to study English for a year, I never dreamed that I would ever experience a moment like right now presenting a speech in the language that I came here to learn and in front of so many people!

I arrived in Kingston in August 2004. It was the beginning of new experiences: a new family, different culture, interesting food, as well as attending a Canadian high school.

Improve Your Reading
