There are two similarities between Marguerite and Malala. First, they were trying to change their society. Second, they encouraged people and never gave up.

I found out about Malala's speech on You Tube. She said "Thank you to every person who has prayed for my fast recovery and new life. So here I stand, one girl, among many. I speak not for myself, but so those without a voice can be heard. Those who have fought for their rights. Their right to live in peace. Their right to be treated
